



2nd Congress

The second Congress of WFDF has been held and a new president has been elected. Charlie Mead left his presidency after one year to give more time to his family and his new work in Birmingham. We thank him for all his work and wish him good luck in the future. The new president for WFDF for two years is Dan "stork" Roddick, Los Angeles. We wish him welcome and we know that he will do a lot of work for WFDF too.

The Congress itself was held in a very friendly tone and almost all decisions were taken unanimously. There were some changes in the statutes, the biggest being that the board is elected for two years, but with some members being elected odd years and some on even years. The Congress also decided that each member association gets one vote at Congress but that some special associations, like UPA and PDGA are also members of WFDF. There was also a small change in the TRG-composition.

Apart from the change in president, Jacques Doetsch, Belgium was elected as treasurer for two years and Eric Wooten as boardmember for two years. Johan Lindgren was elected as secretary for one more year and Shinshiro Ebashi, Japan was elected as boardmember for one year.

§ 1 OPENING

Charlie Mead welcomes everyone to Colchester and the Congress. An adresslist is passed around.

§ 2 PARTICIPATION AND VOTINGLIST

12 national associations and 3 american associations are present. They are: Norway, Denmark, Belgium, Sweden, Italy, Holland, Japan, Finland, Britain, Westgermany, Switzerland, Canada, USDS, UPA and FPA. All are given one vote each and the votinglist is decided to 15 votes.

§ 3 SUMMONING ACCORDING TO THE STATUTES

The Congress agrees that the summoning has been done according to teh statutes.

§ 4 ELECTION OF OFFICIALS FOR THE MEETING

Charlie Mead is elected chairman for the meeting and Johan Lindgren secretary. Erik Hammer and Per-Olov Mörn are elected to count votes and signing the minutes.

§ 5 ALTERATIONS OF THE STATUTES

The Congress agrees that one vote per member is the right thing but the situation in America has to be considered. This is done by changing the writing in §3:1. The word "national" is taken away so that flying disc associations can become members of WFDF. Accordning to the statutes it is still the Congress that decides on applications for membership so if someone tries to start a phony association to get a vote at the Congress it will not be accepted as a member. § 4:3 is then simply formulated: Each member association have one vote at the Congress. This was accepted unanimously.

It was unanimously accepted that all boardmembers should be elected for two years but on alternating years so that the whole board is not changed at the same time. This means that points 10-13 in § 4:8 will be changed and instead contain the election of president, treasurer and one boardmember in one year and election of secretary and one boardmember the next year. it also means some changes to the elections in this congress.

The proposed change of § 8:4 was unanimously accepted as written by the board.

In § 11:7 the word "free" and the second sentence was taken away. the decision was unanimous.

A new paragraph, § 11:8 was unanimously added reading: The RUC-representative shall be afforded accomodation and food at WFDF-sanctioned tournaments for the purpose of beeing part of the TRG.

§ 6 YEARLY REPORT

There was some discussion on the late sanctioning of the PDGA tournament in Charlotte and Eric reported on the PDGA critisism on that. Johan L gave the full report on the GAISF-issue. The yearly report was unanimously accepted.

§ 7 ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT

It was added that Belgium had payed for both 1985 and 1986 totally USD 50 to Charlie Mead but htat he had forgot to pass the money on to Brendan. With that the annual financial report was unanimously accepted.

§ 8 AUDITORS REPORT

Since Brendan had gone to America without sending the material to the auditors it had not been possible to audit the period. It will be done when Brendan returnes home.

§ 21 DISC GOLF COMMITTEE

Elected are: Ted Smethers (chairman), Mats Bengtsson, Bob Blakely and Fumio Morooka.

§ 22 FIELD EVENTS COMMITTEE

Elected are: Jan Ekman (chairman), Tami Pellicane, Hiroshi Oshima, Carlos Rio and Martin Sievers.

§ 23 FREESTYLE COMMITTEE

Elected are: Bill Tulin (chairman), Bill Wright, Jan Ekman and Chieko Kakimoto.

§ 24 MEMBERSHIP FEES

The membership fee is decided to minimum 50 swiss franc per association to be payed no later than april 1 1987.

The fee per player att overall and utlimate and guts world championship is decided to CFR 10.

The fee per player at event world championships is decided to CFR 2.

No decision is taken on a sanctioning fee.

§ 25 PLAN OF ACTION

The issue is postponed until later in the Congress.

§ 26 BUDGET

This year is expected to bring maybe around USD 6000. Around 3000 from the worlds in Essex, about 1000 in membership fees and the rest from sponsoring and sales.

The costs for boardmeetings and stamps are estimated to USD 2 500.

It is decided that each committee can cost up to USD 100, money beeing payed from the treasurer to the chairman of the committees when they send in reciets for costs. Of course the money does not have to be spent. If any committee needs more money, it has to go to the board and ask for it. Left is hopefully a little over 2000.

§ 27 PROPOSALS

GAISF: A rather long discussion takes place, but everyone seems positive to applying for membership. It is unanimously decided that WFDF apply for membership in GAISF. Johan L shall immediately write to GAISF although it is too late too apply since the General Assembly is in october. JL will also write to the World Games. The board decides if we send someone to Monte Carlo for the General Assembly.

At this point Charlie Mead has to leave the Congress for his duties with the world championship. Eric Wootten is elected new chairman for the meeting.

INFO: With this the motion from Bill Tulin (motion no 3) is discussed. Everyone seems positive to the idea of a PR-committe, but WFDF cant afford to employ anyone or do things or materials that cost much. It is unanimously decided to start a PR-committee. (Note: Since Charlie Mead had to leave the meeting Britain is abstaining from all decisions hereafter.)

Bill Tulin is elected chairman of the PR-committee and the committee members are taken one each from the other committees. The committee can then co-opt other people if it is needed. The aims of the committee is to gather information from the other committees and other sources. Soon some printed matter describing WFDF and the disc sport should be produced. mainly for use in Monte Carlo. In the future the PR-committee should build a bank of photos, info, videos and educational help to assist WFDF:s member associations.

The PDGA agrees to sanction and support this tournament as a part of the official PDGA Pro Tour and to maintain a permanent record of the results of this tournament. The applicant, as Tournament Director, agrees to direct the tournament at this course on the agreed date and further agrees to the following:

1. To strictly enforce the PDGA Rules of Play and Technical Standards for Equipment used in play.
2. To provide to the PDGA Statistics Committee the results of the tournament including the names, addresses, PDGA membership numbers, prize money, order of finish of all PDGA members, and a complete balance sheet of income and all expenses within 72 hours of completion of play.
3. To distribute prize money as follows:
 - a. No more than 10% of the gross to the Tournament Director for fees.
 - b. Return \$1 per entrant donation to the PDGA for Pro Tour expenses.
 - c. The balance to the top third of each Pro division, except for reasonable expenses incurred.
 - d. If the tournament is halted due to foul weather before 36 holes have been completed by all Pro players, all entry money, except the Tourney Directors' percentage, shall be returned and the tournament cancelled.
4. Play shall consist of at least 54 holes prior to a cut, or 36 holes when play has been suspended by foul weather in accordance with PDGA Rules of Play.
5. Players shall be randomly grouped for the first round of play. Thereafter, players shall be grouped according to the cumulative scores.
6. A player may enter and play in only one division per tournament.
7. By failing to meet the terms of this agreement, the Tournament Director understands that he/she may be subject to sanctions up to and including loss of recognition as Course Pro and directing future PDGA Pro Tour Tournaments.

WFDF STATUTES

(As decided by the Congress in Helsingborg, Sweden 14-16 aug 1985)
(Revised by the Congress in Colchester, England 23-24 aug 1986)

At least 2 months before the Congress each member association shall receive complete material for the Congress, including agenda, the annual reports, statutes, proposals and motions.

4:3

Each member association receive one vote at Congress.

4:4

All votes are taken by open voting unless any representative demands ballot voting. All votes shall be done by an absolute majority of the given votes.

4:5

All representatives have the right to speak and make suggestions at the Congress. Only those associations that have payed their membership fees before the end of march before the Congress can vote at the Congress. A member association can proxy anyone they wish to be their representative. A representative can only hold one vote and has to be present to vote.

4:6

The Congress shall form a quorum with the number of associations that attend, provided that the Congress has been summoned according to the statutes.

4:7

Any board and/or committee member, also being a voter at the Congress, can not vote on freedom from responsibility, election of auditors or questions concerning his/her past work. Such representative may pass his/her vote in that question to an other nonvoting representative.

4:8

At the Congress the following points shall be on the agenda:

- 1/ Opening.
- 2/ Participation and votinglist.
- 3/ Has the Congress been summoned according to the statutes?
- 4/ Election of chairman for the meeting, secretary for the meeting and two officials for counting votes and signing minutes.
- 5/ Alteration of the statutes (Only at regular Congress).
- 6/ Annual report.
- 7/ Annual financial report.
- 8/ Auditors report.
- 9/ Question of freedom from responsibility for the WFDF-board.
- 10/ Every second year election of president for WFDF for two years.
- 11/ Every second year election of secretary for WFDF for two years.

12/ Every second year election of treasurer for WFDF for two years.

(President and treasurer are elected in the same year and secretary the opposing year.)

13/ Election of one board-member for two years.

14/ Election of 3 ranked deputys.

15/ Election of 2 auditors + 1 deputy auditor.

16/ Election of a returning officer + 2 additional members of the election committee (ELC).

17/ Election of a Rules Committee (RUC). 3 persons of which one is elected chairman.

18/ Election of a Minority Interests Committee (MIC). 3 persons of which one is elected chairman.

19/ Election of an Ultimate Committee (UC). 3 persons of which one is elected chairman.

20/ Election of a Guts Committee (GC). 3 persons of which one is elected chairman.

21/ Election of a Disc Golf Committee (DGC). 3 persons of which one is elected chairman.

22/ Election of a Field Events Committee (FEC). 5 persons of which one is elected chairman.

23/ Election of a Freestyle Committee (FSC). 3 persons of which one is elected chairman.

24/ Decision on membership fees and other fees.

25/ Plan of action for the coming period.

26/ Budget for the coming period.

27/ Proposals.

28/ Motions.

29/ World Championship cites (Only at regular Congress).

30/ Appointing honorary members (Only at regular Congress).

31/ Closing of the Congress.

4:9

Eligible for election on points 10-14 and 16-23 are members of member associations, at least 20 years old and not employees of WFDF. Eligible for election on points 15 and 16 are persons, at least 20 years of age, not employed by WFDF and not elected to any other position in WFDF.

4:10

An extra Congress shall be summoned within 6 months if the WFDF-board, the auditors, or at least 2/3 of the voting power of the member associations demands so in writing to the WFDF-board. The extra Congress shall in all respects be treated as a regular Congress except that the statutes may not be changed, honorary members may not be appointed and sites for World Flying Disc Championships may not be changed unless the responsible association no longer want the tournament.

8:2

The RUC shall no later than January 1 produce a list of discs acceptable according to the disc regulations in the rules. Manufacturers of disc on this list may acquire the right to use this in their commercial promotion if they come to an agreement with WFDF.

8:3

The RUC shall no make their own suggestions on rule changes. Such suggestions shall come from the different event committees or a member association.

8:4

The RUC shall be represented at all World Flying Disc Championships and together with one representative of the players and one representative of the organizer form the Tournament Rule Group (TRG).

The TRG shall act as a jury for the tournament and shall arbitrate and make decisions which are binding on all rule questions during the tournament.

9:0 THE EVENT COMMITTEES (UC, GC, DGC, FEC and FSC.)

9:1

Their general task is to look after and develop their respective events. They shall together with RUC revise the rules and be represented at their respective World Flying Disc Championships.

9:2

The Ultimate Committee (UC) and Guts Committee (GC) shall be responsible for their respective events and cooperate if any new team related flying disc sports should develop. Both committees shall make suggestions for possible sites for their world championships, and be represented at those world championships.

9:3

The Disc Golf Committee (DGC) shall make suggestions on possible sites for World Disc Golf Championships. It shall work for the development of international golf tours, both professional and amateur in all divisions. It shall co-operate with FEC about overall world championships. It shall develop a standard for disc golf courses and make a catalogue of courses that meet that standard. It shall be represented at WDGC.

9:4

The Field Events Committee (FEC) (i.e. Accuracy, Discathlon, Distance, Double Disc Court and Self Caught Flights) shall together with DGC and FSC make suggestions for the siting of the overall world championships. It shall be represented at these championships. It shall also be consulted when bids for separate event world flying disc championships are made. FEC shall also promote individual play and try to have other international overall tournaments organized.

9:5

The Freestyle Committee (FSC) shall work with FEC on overall world championships. FEC shall also promote separate international freestyle tournaments and world championships and be present at those championships. FEC shall also try to develop and encourage freestyle shows in appropriate forums to help the fulfilment of the aims of WFDF. FSC shall develop routines for performing and judging freestyle and these suggestions shall be put forward to RUC.

9:6

All committees shall follow the aims and statutes of WFDF. They shall report to and follow the decisions of the WFDF-board. All committees shall submit material to the newsletter.

10:0 FINANCE

10:1

Each member nation shall, before the end of March each year, pay the fee for the coming year. The fee shall be decided on by the Congress. If the fee is decided to be member related or in some other way constructed to be different for different member associations, then the association joining during a year will only have to pay the lowest fee for that first year.

10:2

There shall also be a fee for the right to organize a world championship. The fee shall be decided on by the Congress. The association organizing a world championship shall no later than 1 month after the championship send the fee to WFDF together with a summary of the tournament including accounts, results, names and addresses of all competitors, media coverage and possible comments.

12:0 RECORDS

12:1

The WFDF shall recognise records in the following events: Accuracy, Distance, MTA and TRC, in the following divisions: Open, Women, Juniors (<=18), Under 12, Masters (35-44), Grand Masters (45-54) and Senior Grand Masters (55+).

12:2

In order for a record to be valid it has to be achieved at an international tournament organized or sanctioned by WFDF or at a national tournament organized and sanctioned by a member nation or at an european tournament organized or sanctioned by EFDF. The WFDF rules must have been used at the competition.

The information about a new record must be sent to the WFDF-board as soon as possible. This must be done on a Flying Disc World Record report form, which must be completely filled out and accompanied by evidence that the tournament was properly organized or sanctioned.

12:3

The WFDF-board shall regularly, not less than twice a year, publish and distribute lists of the present world records to the member associations.

12:4

If the WFDF-board does not accept a record the player's national association can appeal to the Congress.

12:5

If any member association disagrees with any new record it can also appeal to the Congress.

13:0 ALTERATIONS OF THE STATUTES

13:1

These statutes can only be changed at a regular Congress with an absolute majority of the given votes.

13:2

Motions on alterations must be made at least 4 months before the Congress and proposals to alterations at least 2 months before the Congress.

13:3

If there is any doubt about the meaning of any statute, or if a new matter arises that is not covered in the statutes, the question must wait until the next Congress. If the matter is urgent the WFDF-board may take a temporary decision.

14:0 WINDING UP

14:1

The WFDF can only be dissolved by two consecutive Congress' of which one must be a regular Congress. This decision can only be taken by a vote of 2/3 majority each time. There must be at least 6 months between the two Congress'.

14:2

If the WFDF is dissolved its assets shall be sent to the United Nations work for children.

To the Congress of the
World Flying Disc Federation:

I must offer my apologies to all of you for not being able to address you in person as I would have preferred. My business and academic schedules are extremely full and unfortunately, I cannot get away at this time.

It has come to my attention that many of the members of the Congress are considering the elimination of the committee system. I believe that this would be a great mistake. It is agreed that few of the committees have produced any tangible results, and this is indeed disappointing. The fault, however, is not in the system itself but in the understanding of the goals and objectives of the individual committees.


As much as we would like to speed the process, the wheel turns very slowly. One year is simply not enough time to properly evaluate the system's performance. To be successful, a committee must have a clearly defined role. It must understand how it fits in with the goals of the larger organization, what its duties and deadlines are. These are complex questions which cannot be answered overnight. It is important that the Congress take some time to address these issues, but the process should not stop there. It may take another year or longer to properly answer these questions.

The Congress may decide that the committees should merely serve to keep open the lines of communication, gathering and distributing information, or the Congress may choose to have the committees play a more active role, developing specific projects or focusing attention on larger philosophical questions. It should be the role of the committees, with the approval of the Congress, to carve out an agenda for the future.

I have a number of ideas on how this can be done. However, my work and school commitments for the next few years make it impossible for me to play an active role in organizing the Ultimate Committee. Therefore, I must offer you my resignation as Chairman, and I nominate the present director of the Ultimate Players Association, Mr. Gary McGivney, to take over that position. I have known and worked with Mr. McGivney for many years, and I am confident that he can carry on this work.

In closing, I urge you to retain the committee system for at least another two year period and strongly consider Mr. McGivney for Chairman of the Ultimate Committee. Best wishes to all, and I hope to see you in 1988.

3. The Disc Sports itself

3.1. The Distance Event - Limitations of the Disc

It is a great pity that the evolution of the disc has ruled the most natural event, the Distance, out of the great stadiums. Perhaps it is too late to do something about it, but still it should be considered.

Here we cannot avoid taking sides to the philosophic question of free evolution, an opinion that I read in one of the circulars two years ago. I believe it has by now been abandoned, as - in the name of logic - then should also the rings (the Aerobie!) be accepted.

3.2. The Accuracy Event

In its present form the Accuracy is not interesting. What we need is a net to the hoop (in order to gain the charm that Basketball shooting has), as well as reduction to the duration of the individual performance (e.g. instead of seven throwing sites to have four - two straight, and two at the sides).

3.3. Competition Package

In order to become a world sport we need to enter the great games, Pan American, Commonwealth etc. That we cannot accomplish without a compact competition package, something else than we have in our internal activities. Distance (stadium scale!), Accuracy (revised) and MTA would make a nice combination as a field package (I'd call it the Tridisc), and would be supplemented with Golf - conditions allowing.

3.4. The Hierarchy - Disc versus Game

For some years I have been worried about the dominance of Ultimate in Finland (and all Europe?). The main asset of the Disc Sport, in my opinion, is the charm and challenge of the disc. As an instrument of the game the disc loses (a part of) this charm, even becomes an obstacle on beginner's way to the charms of playing.

The Disc sport should not be sold with the charm of playing but the charm of the disc! The Ultimate game - a fine game in itself - is a threat to this principle.

My intention last year was that in the congress we would have had a Philosophic Symposium on these subjects. As that could not be carried out I have to settle for informing them to You just in writing. I hope that in the near future such a symposium could be held (in Europe!) and I could participate.

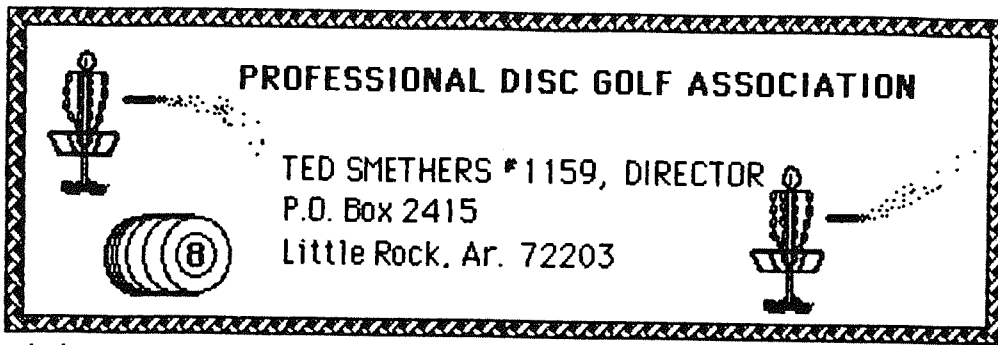

These Regional Championships will not need to be awarded more points as it is expected that they will be large-draw events which will increase points automatically. **These tournaments will not be listed as such unless so designated by the Regional Coordinator.** These tournaments should try to guarantee at least \$2000 in total purse prize money. However, do not guarantee any prize money for any tournament unless you are prepared to back it up on the day of the tournament, regardless of what your sponsor has done.

Finally the United States has one(1) World Cup Tournament to schedule. We would like to have it either in the Mid-West, South, or East Coast. We would also like to give it to the largest tournament from these areas. Interested tournament promoters should get in touch with Ted Smethers to make your proposal. These World Cup tournaments should be excellent promotional vehicles and will hopefully draw a truly international field.

Good luck with your tournament promotions. Let's make 1987 the biggest year yet!

Subject: Scheduling the 1986/87 PDGA World Pro Tour

The 1986/87 World Pro Tour will be conducted much as it was last year with only a few enhancements. You will notice that the name has been changed to World Tour. This is an important achievement and we will need everyone's cooperation to make this a reality. Our international contacts are few and I want to ask everyone to help us notify those tournament directors in Europe, Africa, and especially Asia and Australia. To my knowledge there is no activity in South America.

1987 will see the first World Cup series of tournaments. This will be conducted as a subset of the much larger World Tour. The World Tour is a comprehensive listing of all PDGA Sanctioned tournaments. The World Cup will be a series of 10 specially identified tournaments that will award an extra set of points to the top 15 finishers (see the attached letter for more information).

The Regional Coordinators are also asked to identify 2 tournaments in their regions as Regional tournaments. These tournaments will be noted as such and should be expected to have much larger draws than other tournaments. If possible these tournaments should try to guarantee \$2000 in prize money.

Finally, we will only allow a maximum of 2 tournaments per city per season. These should be on different courses if possible.

We need to finalize the schedule by November 1st so let's get busy and get those agreements in. We will not sanction a tournament if we cannot schedule it early enough to get the date published in the newsletter. **Do not expect to wait until 1 month before the tournament and receive sanctioning.**
