From the Editor

As an elected secretary/treasurer of WFDF maybe I should not express my views on issues under debate, but I cant help doing so anyway:

WFDF has been finding its ground for some five years. In the beginning everyone was content with what was initially achieved, but now it is time for more direct action. The Ultimate meeting in Toronto suggest that WFDF set up more precise goals, with Ultimate and Disc Golf as the main priorities, and encourage the WFDF board to work harder to fulfill these goals.

I think it is positive if we can decide on more specified goals and devote our time and efforts to fulfill those. The projects of aiding new countries to come to Japan, disc missionaries and collection of educational material are all very good and should be started immediately.

As a secretary since the beginning I have always wanted this kind of response but it has not been so. If this can be time when we all get into second gear in the work for international development of flying disc play it is very good. But it will be crucial that you all contribute - at least by answering mail, paying the fees and doing whatever task you have accepted to do. If you feel like getting more involved in this work - do not hesitate to contact us.

At the same time I think it is a little sad that the ultimate meeting felt that they had to start of with criticism in order to get the debate going. And their talk of starting a separate world ultimate federation really scares me. It is those kinds of things that would be negative for us all in the eyes of other international sports federations, national sports federations and media.

So my hope is that we can keep on working together to develop the sport that we all like - regardless of which event we prefere - and all give that little extra to make it all happen.

During the ultimate championships in Toronto, Canada, the WFDF ultimate committe met and discussed the future. It resulted in a four page letter adressed to the Congress in Santa Cruz.

In Santa Cruz the suggestions were discussed (as you can see from the minutes) and it ended with a decision that the suggestions by the ultimate committe should be sent out to all member associations for voting. This voting sheet will go out as soon as possible.

This is a summary of the suggestions from the ultimate meeting:

It starts by giving the history of WFDF and summarizes what has been achieved. But at the moment development has ceased and the ultimate committe would like to see a much more active organisation. The meeting talked about starting an International Ultimate Federation but rejected that to continue to work together with the hope that WFDF set up concrete goals and work more actively.

The Seventh WFDF Congress

July 31 and August 1, 1991

Minutes of the meetings

The WFDF Congress met in Santa Cruz, California in conjunction with the World Flying Disc Tournament at University of California at Santa Cruz.

July 31, 1991, Merrill Dorms Recreation Room

Members of the board in attendance were President Dan Roddick, Members Seppo Nieminen, Shinshiro Ebashi and Deputy Fumio Morooka.

● 1 Opening

The WFDF Congress was opened and called to order at 8:42 P.M., July 30, 1991, by Seppo Nieminen.

● 2 Participation

Voting participants present were Finland, Sweden, Norway, Japan, and USD.

● 3 Summoning

The meeting was found to be legally convened according to the WFDF statutes.

● 4 Formalia

Dan Roddick, the president, was elected to chair the meeting.

Doug Korn was elected as secretary.

Robbie Robison and Mike Waskowiak were elected as officials to verify the minutes and count votes, if needed.

Seppo Nieminen turned the meeting over to Dan Roddick.

● 5 AGENDA CHANGE

The agenda for the meeting was approved with changes.

● 6 REPORT FROM JAPAN

Japan Flying Disc President, Shinshiro Ebashi was introduced to discuss next years Guts and Ultimate tourney in Japan on Aug. 17-23, 1992. Shinshiro turned the discussion over to Fumio Morooka. Fumio described plans for the site near Tokyo. Divisions for Ultimate will be Open, Women, Junior and Masters. Divisions for Guts will be Open and Women. One team from each country for each division may be entered. Entry and accommodation fee will be 45,000 yen (about \$350). Charter flights will be arranged from Amsterdam and Los Angeles for about \$1100 round-trip. The Japanese TV stations will be covering the event live with signals that can be received in Korea, Taiwan, and other Asian countries. They want to make it a very enjoyable tournament for all.

● 7 Annual Financial Report

The financial report as prepared by Johan Lindgren was presented and accepted unanimously.

● 8 Auditors Report

The auditors report was made available to the Congress.

● 9 Freedom from Responsibility

The board was released from all liability during the year under review.

● 10 LETTERS FROM THE ULTIMATE COMMUNITY

Dan Roddick informed the meeting that over the past week he had had several phone conversations and three letters from the Ultimate community expressing their concerns and desires. These were written by Robert Rauch, AKA Nob, the current chair of the Ultimate

committee. Dan Roddick presented the proposals with supporting background. The philosophy of disc sport organization was presented by Dan Roddick. The evolution of generalists and specialists in disc sports was discussed.

Proposal 1 was drafted July 20, 1991, and then presented in Toronto at the recent World Ultimate Club Championships. It suggested that Ultimate be pulled out of WFDF and establishes itself as an International Federation of Ultimate Associations that would have weak connection to the World federation and direct connections to the national associations within each country. Goals and sample budget are included along with plans for development of the sport. Apparently the proposal was not completely accepted in Toronto. There was speculation on two reasons for general unacceptability of this proposal at the Ultimate meeting: A.) General sympathy for supporters of WFDF and B.) recognition of the value of the equity which WFDF has developed.

Proposal 2, which was prepared at Toronto, suggested that ultimate stay within the realm of WFDF, but WFDF would change its goals to concentrate more on promotion of Ultimate and Golf. Robert Rauch would be president. Roddick and Nieminen would remain on the board at their option.

Proposal 3, a further revision dated July 26, 1991, proposes a refocusing of WFDF. Roddick read much of the proposal to the attendees. Clear priorities and goals along with new management style were demanded. Two new board members were proposed with the remaining board members and officers unchanged.

Discussion of the evolution of the proposals with the analogy of divorce and reconciliation was presented by Dan Roddick. Discussion was open to the floor.

The issue was discussed at great length by all present.

Seppo Nieminen summarized the discussions. Dan Roddick gave his personal thoughts. He proposed reconvening at 8:00 P.M. Thursday, August 1 to draft a response on the Ultimate issue, then proceed with the agenda.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:15 P.M.

August 1, 1991, OPERS Conference Room, East Field House

Members of the board in attendance were President Dan Roddick, Member Seppo Nieminen, and Deputy Fumio Morooka.

● 11 RECONVENING

Seppo Nieminen reconvened the meeting at 8:50 P.M. and passed the chair to Dan Roddick.

● 12 CONTINUATION OF THE DISCUSSION OF THE ULTIMATE SITUATION

Dan Roddick presented his thoughts about the problem and the possible solutions. Dan Roddick had had new discussions with Robert Rauch since the last meeting. As Charlie Mead pointed out, WFDF is a Federation of national organizations. Therefore Dan Roddick made a proposal that all voting members would receive a voting ballot to choose between two choices, with full explanations of the consequences of each choice. A short limited discussion followed.

Bob Pallares, representing the Ultimate community and speaking for Robert Rauch, expressed the major desires of increasing the size of the board by two members and some decentralization of authority.

Dan Roddick was unanimously given authority to draft a proposal, with the help of Robert Rauch and other interested parties, to be sent to the WFDF member organizations discussing the options, possibilities and consequences.

The published agenda was resumed.

● 13 Alteration of the Statues
Seppo Nieminen has done a proposal for revision of the WFDF statutes. Further suggestions are welcome for the final version to be presented at the 1992 Congress.

● 14 Annual Report
The annual report was given. Santa Cruz requested and hosted the present tournament.

The WFDF medals have been completed and will be awarded at the Santa Cruz Tournament.

WFDF has completed the rule book.

The board has met twice by phone conference during the year.

Financial report and related issues had been addressed at the previous meeting.

Committee reports were given.

Blair Paulsen gave the PDGA report in absence of Bill Burns. He stated that the Robert Rauch proposal had not been mentioned before the PDGA board yet.

Carlos Rio from Norway stated that they had proposed a change to Discathon rules relating to a final with five runners. A survey/questionnaire related to use of beveled disc in SCF had been mailed and results from a large number of respondents were summarized. Dan Roddick commented that his survey was exactly the kind of thing WFDF can be useful in achieving on an international basis.

Nick Hart presented the DDC report. They have met by phone twice and suggested rules changes. One item is tipping to the front of the court in a non-escape situation. He mentioned the computer Usenet discussions concerning disc sports.

Dan Roddick stated that he had mailed a letter to all committee chairs asking for a report on committee activity and election information.

● 15 ELECTIONS

Johan Lindgren was unanimously reelected to the position of WFDF secretary.

A letter from Shinshiro Ebashi was read stating that he would not be making himself available for reelection.

Fumio Morooka was elected to replace Ebashi Shinshiro on the board. There were four voters in favor with one abstaining.

Tami Pellicane was unanimously elected to the position of first deputy of succeeding rank.

Olli Visamo was unanimously elected to the position of second deputy of succeeding rank.

Chris Lowcock was unanimously elected to the position of third deputy of succeeding rank.

Fleming Larsen and Jan Ekman were unanimously reelected as auditors.

Raine Forsman was unanimously reelected as deputy auditor.

Eric Hammer was elected to the position of Returning Officer. Four voters approved with one abstaining.

Carlos Rio and Chris Lowcock were elected to the position of Election Committee. Four voters approved with one abstaining.

Charlie Mead was unanimously elected to the position of Rules Committee Chairperson.

Scott Lash, Johan Josjö, Lin Shui-Ming, and Jon Freedman were unanimously elected to the position of Rules Committee member.

Tami Pellicane was unanimously elected to the position of Minority Interest Chairperson.

For the position of Minority Interest Committee members, Barbro Långjuth, Theo Cade, Harvey Brandt and Becky Zimmerman were nominated. A secret ballot was taken with Barbro Långjuth and Theo Cade being elected.

Robert Rauch was unanimously elected to the position of Ultimate Committee Chairperson.

Masakazu Honda, Chris Lowcock, Juha Jalovaara, and Paul Eriksson were unanimously elected to the position of Ultimate Committee member.

Lige Johnson was unanimously elected to the position of Guts Committee Chairperson

Satoru Kimura, Thomas Marusich, Chris Lowcock, and Anders Lindén were unanimously elected to the position of Guts Committee member.

Carlos Rio was elected to the position of Field Events Committee Chairperson. Four voters were in favor with one abstaining.

Bob Holgan, Tami Pellicane, Hiroshi Oshima, and Dan Berman were unanimously elected to the position of Field Events Committee member.

Blair Paulsen was elected to the position of Disc Golf Committee Chairperson. Four voters were in favor with one abstaining.

Mikko Laakso, John Houck, Leonard Muise, and Martin Ryland-Adair were unanimously elected to the position of Disc Golf Committee member.

Bill Wright was elected to the position of Freestyle Committee Chairperson.

Jan Ekman, Peter Bowie, Kevin Givens, and Chieko Kakimoto were unanimously elected to the position of Freestyle Committee member.

Nick Hart was unanimously elected to the position of DDC Committee Chairperson.

Dan McInnis, Robbie Robison, Thomas Lindell, and Harvey Brandt were unanimously elected to the position of DDC Committee member.

Vance Anderson was unanimously elected to the position of Public Relations Committee Chairperson.

● 16 MEMBERSHIP FEES

The yearly membership fee will continue to be 150 Swiss Francs. Voters were unanimous.

The board was given the authority to waive the player fee at small World Championships, such as the Seniors.

The board was given the authority to decide the fee for provisional members.

● 17 PLAN OF ACTION

It was stated as a specific goal for all committees to establish a national contact list for their sport. This list would be coordinated by the Rules committee.

The plan of action was approved.

● 18 BUDGET

The budget was read and unanimously approved.

● 19 PROPOSALS

There were no new proposals. Vance discussed desires and connections to promote a Russian peace tour.

● 20 MOTIONS

There were no new motion.

● 21 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Dan Roddick discussed the need for a bid to host the next championships. Sweden still has interest in hosting the 1993 WFDF Overall Championships and the Club Ultimate Championship.

The United Kingdom Flying Disc Association submitted a bid to host the 1994 WFDF Club Ultimate Championships and Guts Championships. It was unanimously accepted by the voters.

Fort Collins, Colorado, USA will submit a bid to hold the 1995 WFDF Overall Championships.

● 22 HONORARY MEMBERS

There were no honorary member.

● 23 CLOSING

Dan Roddick declared the official meeting of the Seventh WFDF Congress to be adjourned at 11:40 P.M.

1. WFDF needs to establish clear priorities and goals. Most of WFDF's efforts will be focussed on Ultimate and Disc Golf. While supporting other disc disciplines, little work will be done centrally to actively promote these disciplines.

2. The management style of WFDF will be changed. Instead of being a passive vehicle for communication between national associations, WFDF will take on a proactive stance and work to accomplish the tangible goals which will be set for both Ultimate and Golf.

The document then describes the situation of ultimate world wide and lists these goals:

Short-Term Goals

1. Develop marketing and educational materials which could be used by all national associations.

2. Ensure that Ultimate is played with consistent rules throughout the world.

3. Introduction of ultimate into new countries, with special emphasis on South America, Africa and Eastern Europe.

4. Continued involvement with the World Games and other similar movements.

Long Term Goals

1. Ultimate played in 50 countries by the year 2000, in 75 countries by 2008.

2. Affiliation with and recognition by major sports associations by the year 2000.

3. Participation in Regional Games sponsored by the IOC in the year 2006.

4. Participation in the Olympics by the year 2016.

5. Large growth in Ultimate players; 100,000 registered players by the year 2000.

6. Ultimate played in schools and in community leagues throughout the world; total estimated regular participation in Ultimate of two million players by the year 2000.

Management style

As indicated above we would like to see the management style become much more pro-active. It is entirely appropriate for most of the work relating to individual disc disciplines to be accomplished on the committee level. However, there is much more that needs to be done on

a centralized basis. We suggest the following activities for the coming year:

1. Special emphasis needs to be directed at countries in Asia. With Japan hosting the 1992 World Ultimate Championships we should take steps to ensure that countries that currently have programs receive assistance in attending the tournament. Target countries include Taiwan and New Zealand. Such assistance could take many forms, including, for example, (a) phone calls by a WFDF board member to provide advice and encouragement or (b) documentary assistance in working with governmental agencies. WFDF should also attempt to develop interest in countries which have not yet developed an active program. Such efforts would include all of the above plus (a) the additional work of identifying and enthusiastic local point person and (b) providing free discs to bolster participation (disc availability is a problem in some of the lesser developed countries). Target countries would be Phillipines, Korea, Malaysia and Thailand. Under the direction of WFDF and under joint funding of WFDF, JFDA and the UPA a successful campaign could be undertaken.

2. Long-term development efforts need to be undertaken in the developing world. The partial funding of the trip to Leningrad earlier this year is a step in the right direction, but we feel such efforts can be done in a more cost effective manner. Disc players, being a fairly mobile bunch, tend to do a fair amount of travelling. Player missionaries are our best ambassadors. We should develop a list of target countries and make it known that any disc player travelling to such countries will receive, not a travel stipend, but rather, a disc allotment and educational materials to distribute while travelling. A sample of target countries include, but would not be limited to, Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, Colombia, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland, USSR, Peoples Republic of China, Zimbabwe, Botswana, Ghana, Zaire and the Asian countries listed above. The UPA has done this successfully in the past.

3. There are a fair amount of educational and promotional materials which have been developed by various national associations and disc discipline organizations. These can

only be catalogued and shared through a central clearing house. However, it is unlikely that these will be obtained unless a dedicated individual or group actively tries to track them down. This should be a key priority.

4. Almost all association contacts have a phone and fax. Given the volunteer nature of most of the positions and the competing demands on time by each individual's own association, there is a need for there to be more active, personal contact. Everyone needs a friendly reminder (read as "kick in the butt") from time to time. This will also serve to strengthen the ties of these individuals to the international cause. It is the responsibility of the Board to ensure this is done. No non-profit organization works well without this kind of hand-holding.

5. WFDF may wish to consider providing compensation to individuals for taking on certain special projects which involve a lot of work. Even if the compensation is nominal, money is a powerful incentive for interesting individuals to take on a task and get it accomplished.

6. There is a need to reduce the dichotomy between the odd and even year Congresses. While certain intractable problems exist given the different featured World Championships each year, some greater forethought could be given in the scheduling to reduce the conflicts. In addition, scheduling a meeting which drags late into the night on a week night of a tournament is a bad idea given that most of our delegates are also players.

7. The Congresses should become much more action-oriented. The statutory and organization issues should be dealt with as much as possible before the meeting so that they do not detract from the limited time available for the discussion of more important topics. The board should ensure that Committee reports are prepared and received by the meeting (again, this will most assuredly require some extra phone calls and hand-holding). If these things were done correctly, the Board could set a much more ambitious agenda for the Congress to the benefit of all disc disciplines and there would be time to deal with them.

The rest is some questions and explanations directed to the Congress.

New World Record

During the World Overall championships in Santa Cruz Amy Bekken, USA, achieved a new world record in MTA. The new record is 11,81 seconds. Several national records was also set.

So far I have heard of three swedish ones. Rhode Johansson made 113,53 meters in distance and 57,93 meters in TRC. Fredrik Granåsen made 83,76 meters in TRC.
